Meeting Focus

We are pleased to return to Jakarta for the eighth meeting of the Asia Dialogue on Forced Migration (ADFM), more than two years after we held our fourth ADFM meeting there in March 2017.

Since its establishment in 2015, the ADFM has become a leading Track II forum for genuine dialogue on the critical forced migration issues facing the region. In partnership with the Bali Process and ASEAN we have contributed to changes in governance, policy and practice benefiting refugees, stateless, and trafficked persons.

The ADFM meeting will take place after key elections in the region including in Australia, Thailand and Indonesia. It will occur at a time when governments and institutions are considering next steps on critical displacement challenges - for instance at the 34th ASEAN Summit and related meetings in Bangkok in June, the 52nd ASEAN Foreign Ministers' Meeting in July, and the Bali Process Ad Hoc Group Senior Officials Meeting in July. Meeting again in Jakarta also provides a unique opportunity to deepen our engagement with ASEAN bodies.

The seventh ADFM meeting was held in Bangkok in November 2018. Since then, the ADFM Secretariat published its assessment of the risk of Rohingya and Bangladeshi nationals in Cox's Bazar becoming victims of human trafficking, migrant smuggling and related exploitation. Feedback received in Bangkok helped shape the final recommendations, which the ADFM Secretariat continue to advance with key stakeholders.

In Jakarta, we look forward to productive sessions on:

- The future of regional governance of refugees and migrants at risk, including implementation of the Global Compacts on Migration and Refugees, and the roles of ASEAN and the Bali Process and their ongoing collaboration;
- The future of regional practice in responding to the protection challenges of refugees and migrants at risk, particularly with regard to alternatives to the detention of children, trafficking in persons, and return and reintegration; and
- Coordinated responses to mass displacement in Myanmar and Bangladesh, including to the identified risks of trafficking in persons.
