Mr Andy Rachmianto Indonesia

Mr Andy Rachmianto is currently Indonesian Ambassador to Jordan and Palestine. He is the former Director for International Security and Disarmament for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, in charge of issues related to transnational organised crime, including people smuggling and trafficking in persons. Mr Rachmianto began his career as a junior diplomat at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He then served as Functional Staff at the Office of the Assistant to Indonesia's Chairman in the Non-Aligned Movement.



He has also worked for the Indonesian Embassy in New Delhi. Mr Rachmianto previously served as Personal Secretary to the Director-General for ASEAN Cooperation. He has also served as the Minister Counsellor at the Permanent Mission of the Republic of Indonesia to the United Nations in New York. Mr Rachmianto has a Bachelor of Arts in International Relations from the University of Padjadjaran and a Master's of Philosophy from the School of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University.

Mr Bryce Hutchesson Australia

Mr Bryce Hutchesson was appointed as Australian Ambassador for People Smuggling and Human Trafficking in 2019. He is a senior career officer with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT), and was most recently Australia's High Commissioner to Sri Lanka. Mr Hutchesson has previously served overseas as Deputy High Commissioner in New Delhi, with earlier postings in Bangkok and Tel Aviv. He has also served in Washington with the Office of National Assessments.



In Canberra, Mr Hutchesson has led DFAT's South and West Asia Division and several branches responsible for international security. Mr Hutchesson holds a Bachelor of Laws and Bachelor of Commerce from the University of Melbourne.

Dr C R Abrar Bangladesh

Dr. Abrar teaches International Relations at the University of Dhaka, Bangladesh and directs the Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU). He has conducted research on Rohingya refugees, Bihari stateless people, labour migration and recruitment industry issues.



RMMRU is a leading policy research, training and advocacy body on refugee, migration and displacement issues. Abrar was educated at the Universities of Dhaka and Sussex before doing his PhD from Griffith University, Australia. He is a founding member of the Committee for the Protection of Fundamental Rights and a regular columnist in leading English dailies of Bangladesh.

Mr David Wilden Australia

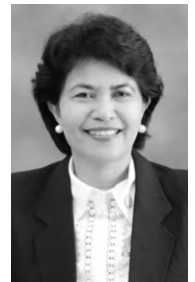
Mr David Wilden is the First Assistant Secretary of the International Policy Division at the Department of Home Affairs. He is responsible for providing the Department, portfolio agencies and the wider government with advice on international policy issues in relation to immigration, national security and international engagement. Mr Wilden previously led the Immigration and Citizenship Policy Division and was responsible for policy development and advice for temporary and permanent visas in the skilled, family, and humanitarian programs as well as the citizenship, status resolution and community protection areas.



From 2009 to 2012 Mr Wilden was Regional Director, Europe, based in London. Over the course of his career, Mr Wilden has worked in a range of government departments and agencies including Centrelink and the Public Service Commission and across functional areas as diverse as IT and Human Resource Management. David has a Graduate Certificate in Public Administration and a Masters of Business Administration.

Dr Dewi Fortuna Anwar Indonesia

Dr Dewi Fortuna Anwar is a Research Professor at the Center for Political Studies-Indonesian Institute of Sciences (P2P-LIPI) and was the Deputy Chair for Social Sciences and Humanities-LIPI (IPSK-LIPI) from 2001 to 2010. She is also the Chair of the Institute for Democracy and Human Rights, The Habibie Center, a private think-tank based in Jakarta. Between October 2010 and May 2015, Dewi served as Deputy Secretary for Political Affairs, and from May 2015 to February 2017 as Deputy for Government Policy Support to Vice President Boediono and Vice President M. Jusuf Kalla of the Republic of Indonesia, respectively. In 1998-99 Dewi served as Assistant Minister of State Secretariat for Foreign Affairs during the Habibie Presidency.



Dr Fortuna Anwar is currently a member of the Governing Board of Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) and a Board Member of Shift, based in New York. She served as a member of the Weapons of Mass Destruction Commission (WMDC) in 2004-2006, and a member of the UN Secretary General's Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters in 2008-2012. She obtained her PhD from Monash University, Melbourne in 1990, while her M.A. and B.A. (Hons) were from the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS), University of London.

Mr François Kernin International

Mr François Kernin is the Head of the Regional Mixed Movement Monitoring Unit in UNHCR Regional Office for South-East Asia. Before his current assignment, François was Regional Durable Solutions Officer with UNHCR Regional Office in Amman, Jordan, focusing on the Syrian Crisis, where he supported regional coordination efforts and provided legal and operational advice on issues related to access to asylum and voluntary repatriation. Previously, he worked with OCHA in the Philippines, and with UNHCR in Tunisia, Côte d'Ivoire and Lebanon. During these experiences, he led and coordinated activities aimed at addressing the needs of refugees, internally displaced persons and stateless persons in contexts of natural disasters and armed conflicts.



François Kernin graduated with BA in Political Science and MA in International Organisations from Sciences Po Grenoble. In addition, he is currently undertaking a Masters in International Human Rights Law with the University of Oxford.

Ibu Grata Endah Werdaningtyas Indonesia

Ibu Grata Endah Werdaningtyas is the Director for International Security and Disarmament, Directorate General for Multilateral Cooperation, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia. Prior to that, she served as Deputy Director for the Rights of Vulnerable Groups at the Directorate of Human Rights and Humanitarian Affairs of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.



Ibu Grata's involvement in and contribution to human rights issues began when she was posted as First Secretary at the Permanent Representative of the Republic of Indonesia to the United Nations in New York. She was also elected to represent the Asia Group as the Vice President of the UNICEF Executive Board in 2011. Grata Werdaningtyas is a graduate from Parahyangan Catholic University in Bandung Indonesia and has a Masters Degree in Social and Political Science from the University of Indonesia.

Ms Ira Rachmawati International

Ms Ira Rachmawati is project manager with the International Trade Union Confederation's division for human and workers' rights, where she led the development of the new digital tool 'Recruitment Advisor'. The tool aims to improve conditions for migrant workers around the world. Ms Rachmawati was previously a campaign coordinator with Konfederasi Serikat Buruh Sejahtera Indonesia (KSBSI).



Mr James Thomson International

Mr James Thomson is the Senior Protection and Policy Advisor for Act for Peace (AfP), the aid agency of the National Council of Churches in Australia. For the past 20 years, he has specialised in forced displacement and protection in conflicts and disasters, focusing on protection strategy, policy development, diplomacy and advocacy, program design and capacity development relating to refugees, internally displaced people, and conflict and disaster-affected communities. Mr Thomson currently heads AfP's global, regional and in-country policy development, advocacy, programming and capacity development work related to protection and forced displacement.



He is a founding member of the International Detention Coalition (IDC) and the Asia-Pacific Refugee Rights Network (APRRN), and served on the IDC's Board for ten years and APRRN's Steering Committee for 5 years. He has chaired the protection working groups of the global ACT Alliance, the Australian Council for International Development, and the Australian Church Agencies Network and is a member of the International Council of Voluntary Agencies Forced Migration Working Group, the Global Protection Cluster and a range of other groups.

Ms Jane Duke Australia

Ms Duke is a senior career officer with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade and the current Australian Ambassador to ASEAN. She has previously served overseas as Deputy High Commissioner to Malaysia (2011 to 2014) and as Counsellor (Immigration) at Australia's Permanent Mission to the United Nations in Geneva (2005 to 2008). In Canberra, Ms Duke has served as Assistant Secretary South East Asia Regional Branch, Assistant Secretary Canada and Latin America Branch and as Assistant Secretary Northern Southern Eastern Europe Branch.



Ms Duke holds a Bachelor of Arts (Asian Studies) majoring in Japanese studies and a Bachelor of Laws (Honours) from the Australian National University. She holds a Graduate Diploma in Legal Practice from the University of Technology, NSW.

Mr Jonathan Martens International

Mr Jonathan Martens is a Senior Migrant Protection Specialist for the International Organization for Migration (IOM). He has previously held positions at IOM headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland, IOM's regional office for Southern Africa in Pretoria, South Africa, and in its country office for Bosnia and Herzegovina in Sarajevo.



Mr Martens holds Bachelor of Civil Law and Bachelor of Common Law degrees from McGill University, Canada.

Pak Jose Antonio Morato Tavares Indonesia

Mr Jose Antonio Morato Tavares is the Director General for ASEAN Political Security Cooperation in the Indonesian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Previously he has served as Ambassador of the Republic of Indonesia to New Zealand, the Independent State of Samoa and the Kingdom of Tonga in December 2013 and Director for Dialogue Partners and Inter-Regional Affairs of ASEAN from May 2010 until early 2012.



Mr Tavares began his career at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1987, and served as Head of the Political Affairs Section at the International Organizations Directorate from 1997 to 1999. During his diplomatic career, he has been assigned to Brussels (1993-1997) at the Mission of the Republic of Indonesia to the European Community; to Paris (2000-2004) as the Deputy Chief of Indonesia's Mission to UNESCO; and to Geneva (2007-2010) as Minister Counsellor of the Permanent Mission of Indonesia to the United Nations in charge of peace and security and disarmament issues. Pak Jose graduated from the Faculty of Social and Government Affairs, Padjajaran University, in Bandung (1980). He studied Development Studies at Murdoch University, Australia (1990-1991) and completed his Master of Arts in Public Policy from Murdoch University (1991-1992).

Mr Lars Stenger International

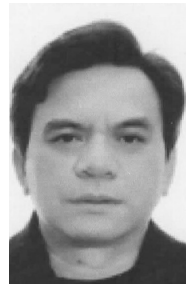
Mr Lars Stenger is National Information and Advocacy Officer at the Jesuit Refugee Service Indonesia. Mr. Stenger has worked in Indonesia since 2006, initially arriving to work on the protection of human rights defenders with Peace Brigades International. He later joined the Jesuit Refugee Services working on durable solutions and displacement prevention for internally displaced persons.



Since 2009, the Jesuit Refugee Service Indonesia has worked with asylum seekers and refugees in immigration detention centres and urban areas, providing accompaniment and a variety of services to them. Mr. Stenger has also been involved with the Asia Pacific Refugee Rights Network since 2008.

Mr Leocadio Trovela Philippines

Mr Trovela is a career executive service official with a rank of CESO IV. He has an extensive 30-year experience in government service starting from 1989. Director Trovela is now serving as the Regional Director in the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) Region 7. He started his stint in the Department as Barangay Government Operations Officer. Director Trovela was previously the Director of the National Barangay Operations Office, DILG Central Office. Before that, he was the Assistant Regional Director of DILG Regional Office 3 and was also the Assistant Director of the Bureau of Local Government Development (BLGD) at the DILG Central Office.



Director Trovela has a Masters degree in Public Administration from the University of the Philippines. He was a United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) Fellow and a graduate of the Environment Management Certificate Course at the University of Adelaide, South Australia. He is deeply involved in anti-trafficking work and is a member of the ASEAN cohort on Trafficking In Persons that is now working on a fellow's project on anti-trafficking.

Mr Md Abu Bakr Siddique Bangladesh

Mr Md. Abu Bakr Siddique is Additional Secretary in the Public Security Division of the Bangladesh Ministry of Home Affairs. He took on this role in January 2018, after having joined in the Bangladesh Civil Service Administration Cadre in January 1991. He worked in different positions in field administration and different ministries.



Mr. Siddique is a member of the National Task Force and Joint Working Group for repatriation of displaced Myanmar residents in Cox's Bazar of Bangladesh. Among others, he also deals with bilateral and international issues, public order, issues related to human trafficking, money laundering, terrorism, illicit drugs, etc.

Dr Mely Caballero-Anthony Singapore

Dr Mely Caballero-Anthony is Professor of International Relations and Head of the Centre for Non-Traditional Security (NTS) Studies at the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS), Nanyang Technological University, Singapore. She is currently the Secretary-General of the Consortium on Non-Traditional Security Studies in Asia. From 2013-2017, Prof Anthony was a member of the UN Secretary-General's Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters and was Chair of ADFM in 2016. She was Director of External Relations at the ASEAN Secretariat from 2011-2012. From 2015-2017, she was Vice President at-large of the Governing Council of the International Studies Association (ISA).



Prof Anthony's research interests include regionalism and multilateralism in Asia-Pacific, human security and non-traditional additional issues in the Asia-Pacific. She has published extensively in peer-reviewed journals and international presses. Her latest books include: *Negotiating Governance on Non-Traditional Security in Southeast Asia and Beyond* (New York: Columbia University Press, 2018).

Mr Michael Odgers International

Mr Michael Odgers is the Australian Co-Manager of the Regional Support Office (RSO) to the Bali Process on People Smuggling, Trafficking in Persons and Related Transnational Crime. The RSO provides support and strengthens practical cooperation on countering people smuggling, trafficking in persons and related transnational crime.



Mr. Odgers is seconded to the RSO from the Australian Department of Home Affairs. He joined the former Australian Customs and Border Protection Service in December 2010 and has served across various Divisions with a focus on international engagement, policy development and capacity building. Prior to 2010 Mr Odgers held senior roles within the airline industry.

Datuk Muhd Khair Razman bin Mohamed Annuar Malaysia

Mr Muhd Khair Razman bin Mohamed Annuar is the Director General of the Department of Human Resources. He was previously the Principal Private Secretary to the Deputy Prime Minister in the Prime Minister's Department. Mr Mohamed Annuar began his career as an Assistant Secretary at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA). In this position he was posted to several divisions in Ministry of Foreign Affairs, namely the South East Asian Division, Organisation of Islamic Conference and the West Asia Division.



Mr Mohamed Annuar pursued a programme on Trafficking in Persons in the United States under the International Visitors Leadership Programme. Upon returning to Malaysia he joined the Research and Planning Division of MOFA. He was promoted to Under-secretary of the International Division and assumed the position of the Secretary of the Malaysian Council for Anti-Trafficking in Persons and Anti-Smuggling Migration. Mr Mohamed Annuar has completed an LLB at Staffordshire University in UK and pursued his LLM in International Law at Southampton University, UK.

Ms Nurdiyana Binti Baharum Malaysia

Ms Nurdiyana Binti Baharum is Special Officer to the Minister of Women, Family, and Community Development, Malaysia. She is heavily involved in policy work and research, and works closely with the Human Rights Commission of Malaysia (SUHAKAM), and international bodies such as the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and NGOs, especially related to children and refugees.



With almost 13 years experience in the Malaysian Government, Ms Nurdiyana was previously a Human Rights Officer at the Prime Minister's Department; Immigration Affairs Division at Ministry of Home Affairs and Special Officer to the Secretary General at Ministry of Rural Development, Malaysia. She holds a Masters in International Development from University of Bath, UK, where her thesis focused on the area of security and protection of refugees in Malaysia.

Mr Paris Aristotle AO Australia

Mr Paris Aristotle is Chief Executive Officer of the Victorian Foundation for the Survivors of Torture. Mr Aristotle has over 25 years' experience in the field of supporting refugees and asylum seekers, particularly the provision of services to survivors of torture and trauma. Throughout this period, Mr Aristotle has worked closely with the UNHCR in the field of refugee resettlement and served on a wide range of state and federal government bodies advising on refugee and asylum seeker policy, and multicultural affairs. These bodies include the Refugee Resettlement Advisory Council and the Immigration Detention Advisory Group. In 2012 he was appointed to the Prime Minister's Expert Panel on Asylum Seekers.



Mr Aristotle is currently the Chair of the Federal Government Minister's Council on Asylum Seekers and Detention (MCASD), and is an Executive Member of the Forum of Australian Services for Survivors of Torture and Trauma (FASSTT). In 2002, Mr Aristotle was made a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) and in 2003 was awarded an Australian Centenary Medal; with both honours recognising his longstanding work with refugees, in particular survivors of torture and trauma. In 2017, Mr Aristotle was named Victorian Australian of the Year and made an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO).

Ms Phasporn Sangasubana Thailand

Ms Phasporn Sangasubana has served as the Thai Permanent Representative to ASEAN since mid-2017. She has a strong background in ASEAN affairs. Prior to her appointment, Ms Phasporn served as the Deputy Director-General of the Department of ASEAN Affairs at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in the Kingdom of Thailand.



Ms Sangasubana has worked in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs since 1987, and has held posts in Norway, Austria, Russia and Singapore. She was the Director in the International Organisations Administrative Division within the Department of International Organisations from 2004 to 2006, and Director of ASEAN 1 Division in the Department of ASEAN Affairs from 2007 to 2009.

Ms Sangasubana holds a Bachelors degree in Political Science from Sophia University in Tokyo, Japan, and a Masters in International Affairs from Ohio Univeristy, Athens, USA.

Mr Rafendi Djamin Indonesia

Mr Rafendi Djamin is currently a Senior Advisor for the Human Rights Working Group: a coalition of Indonesian Human Rights NGOs for International advocacy. Mr Djamin is also a part-time Lecturer at Department of International Relations, Faculty of Social and Political Science, University of Indonesia. He was previously the Regional Director of Amnesty International for South East Asia and the Pacific, and also former Chair of ASEAN Intergovernmental Commission on Human Rights (AICHR) in 2011, representing Indonesian Government over the period of 2009-2015. He was previously a Chair and Consultant on Human Rights in Indonesia for INFOHD, an Amsterdam-based forum for human rights in Indonesia.



Mr Djamin has spent much of his career involved in the examination of global and Regional human rights mechanisms. and has worked to strengthen Indonesian human rights and humanitarian NGOs through his expertise on international advocacy and campaigns. He has a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology from the University of Indonesia and a Masters in Development Studies from the Institute of Social Studies in The Hague.

Dr Rebecca Miller International

Dr Rebecca Miller is Regional Coordinator for Human Trafficking and Migrant Smuggling at the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) based in Bangkok. Prior to this, she was the Manager for People Smuggling and Trafficking in Persons at Immigration New Zealand (INZ) and spent time seconded to the Bali Process Regional Support Office (RSO) based in Bangkok. Before joining INZ, Dr Miller advised governments and worked for various UN agencies, NGOs, and academic institutions, including the University of Auckland and the Institute for Population and Social Research (IPSR) in Bangkok.



Dr Miller studied Criminology, Sociology, and Education at the University of Toronto and Queen's University in Canada, and obtained her PhD in Development Studies from the University of Auckland. Her career has taken her to over fourteen countries throughout Southeast Asia, Africa, and the Pacific. With experience in policy analysis, strategic planning, and research and evaluation, Dr Miller has primarily focused on trafficking in persons, migrant smuggling, human rights, gender, and social protection. Her interests have developed over her career to include governance and institutions, development coordination, and aid relationships

Ms Sarah Loh Singapore

Ms Sarah Loh is a Policy Research Analyst at the Singapore Institute of International Affairs (SIIA) where she focuses her research on social aspects of sustainability. At the SIIA, she is involved in programmes relating to Business and Human Rights and is the main researcher assisting the Chairman in his role as Commissioner on the Financial Sector Commission on Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking (the Liechtenstein Initiative). Ms Loh also contributes to the SIIA's knowledge base and advisory portfolio with regards the humanitarian crisis in Myanmar and analyses geopolitical responses and socioeconomic factors relating to the crisis.



Sarah is a qualified Advocate and Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Singapore. She graduated with a Bachelor of Laws (Honours) from the National University of Singapore, where she was awarded the Faculty Prize in Globalization and International Law.

Ibu Sri Danti Anwar International

Ibu Sri Danti Anwar is Indonesia's Representative to the ASEAN Commission on the Promotion and Protection of the Rights of Women and Children (ACWC) for Women's Rights. She is also a Senior Advisor to the Minister for Family Development and Acting Deputy Minister for Gender Equality at the Ministry of Women's Empowerment and Child Protection of Indonesia.



Prior to this, Ibu Danti was Ministerial Secretary (2010 to 2014), Deputy Minister for Gender Mainstreaming (2007 to 2010), Indonesian Focal Point to ACW and Indonesian Focal Point to APEC WEF. She is a graduate of the University of Adelaide, and has been working with the Ministry since early 1990's. Ibu Danti has actively been involved in producing her country's CEDAW report and has long-time expertise in the field.

Dr Sriprapha Petchamesree Thailand

Dr Sriprapha Petchamesree is currently the Director of the International PhD Program in Human Rights and Peace Studies at the Institute of Human Rights and Peace Studies, Mahidol University, Thailand. She was appointed by the Thai Government as the Thai representative to the ASEAN Intergovernmental Commission on Human Rights (AICHR) where she served between October 2009 to December 2012.



Dr Petchamesree's research and expertise focus on human rights, ASEAN and Southeast Asian studies, migration, including statelessness and citizenship, business and human rights, and international relations. She has spoken and written extensively about all of these issues. She has released a paper with Monash University, regarding the roles of ASEAN on forced migration.

Dr Petchamesree has a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from Thammasat University, Thailand. She received her PhD from the University of Paris-X Nanterre in France.

Dato' Steven CM Wong Malaysia

Dato' Steven Wong is Deputy Chief Executive and Member of the Board of the Institute of Strategic and International Studies (ISIS) Malaysia. He also heads the Institute's economics division. He has worked in the public policy arena for 25 years and has spent an additional eight years in the private sector, where he held senior positions in the capital markets, investment strategy and research, fund management and management consultancy. Dato' Steve Wong has extensive experience in regional affairs, having headed East Asia research with ISIS, and having been on the secretariats of two ASEAN eminent persons groups. He received his graduate and post-graduate education from the University of Melbourne.



Dato' Steven was a member of the Ministry of Human Resource's Technical Committee for the Minimum Wage and Tenaga Nasional Berhad's Economic Council. He has served as the Secretary-General of the Malaysian National Committee for Pacific Economic Co-operation and the Malaysian Committee for Pacific Basin Economic Co-operation.

Ms Sumitha Shaanthinni Kishna Malaysia

Ms Sumitha Shaanthinnni Kishna is the Director of Our Journey, a NGO platform for experts on migration issues to advocate to government and private stakeholders to develop a supportive migration system for non-citizens incorporated with international standards and norms. She is also an advocate and solicitor and the sole proprietor of Chambers of Sumitha. She holds a LLB (Hons) from University of East London and was called to the Malaysian Bar in 2005.



Ms Kishna is a qualified mediator and on the mediators' panel of the Bar Council Mediation Centre. Ms Kishna is also the Co-Coordinator of Migration Working Group Malaysia, a coalition of key NGOs and individuals who advocate for the rights and protection of migrants, domestic workers, refugees, asylum seekers, stateless persons, trafficked persons, and foreign spouses. She serves in many national, regional and international groups/coalitions/networks to advocate for the protection and rights of migrants, domestic workers, refugees, asylum seekers, stateless persons, trafficked persons, and foreign spouses as well as foreign nationals on death row.

Dr Tasneem Siddiqui Bangladesh

Dr Tasneem Siddiqui is a leading migration scholar of Bangladesh. Her work on drivers and impact of labour migration, female labour migration, diaspora, remittances, climate change adaptation and migration, have been published nationally and internationally. She is the Founding Chair of Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU) and Professor of Political Science at the University of Dhaka.



Dr Siddiqui has contributed to major policy changes on migration in Bangladesh. For example, she drafted the National Strategy for Climate and Disaster Induced Internally Displaced Persons in Bangladesh for the Ministry of Disaster and Relief and UNDP (2015). She was one of the key members that drafted the national Overseas Employment Policy, 2006 and the Law Commission initiated draft of the Overseas Employment and Migration Act of 2013. Her research on female labour migration has contributed to the lifting of the ban on international migration of low skilled women from Bangladesh in 2003. More recently, RMMRU's research and policy advocacy has contributed to changing the perception of migration from a failure of local level adaptation to a more inclusive view that treats migration as one of the tools of climate change adaptation in Bangladesh.

Ms Thientong Prasanpanich Thailand

Ms.Thientong Prasanpanich is the Director of System Development Group, Division of Children and Youth Protection Division, Department of Children and Youth, Ministry of Social Development and Human Security with oversight over the implementation of the Convention on the Rights of the Child in Thailand and Children and Youth development and protection. She also serves as the secretariat to the Sub-Committee on the Child Protection System Development under the National Child Protection Commission. She is involved in programmes relating to develop policies and strategies for vulnerable children including children affected from migration.



Currently, Thientong is working to develop cross-border child protection systems and to implement the Memorandum of Understanding on the Determination of Measures and Approaches Alternative to Detention of Children in Immigration Detention Centers, including case management in child protection.

Mr Thomas Vargas International

Mr Thomas Vargas has been working for the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees since January 1994. He is currently serving as UNHCR Representative in Indonesia. In his twenty five years with UNHCR, he has held positions in various countries, including in Central and West Africa, as well as in Europe, and in South East Asia.
