Ms Anisa Farida Indonesia

Ms Anisa Farida is a Second Secretary in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia. She works in the Directorate of International Security and Disarmament, focusing on transnational organised crime, including trafficking in persons, migrant smuggling, drugs, corruption and maritime security.

She has previously worked as an interpreter and was also stationed in Toronto Canada as an attache at the Consulate General of the Republic of Indonesia in 2010.

She has a masters of arts degree from Hankuk University of Foreign Studies and a bachelor of humanities from the University of Airlangga.



Dr Atiq Rahman Bangladesh

Dr Atiq Rahman is a prominent environmentalist, scientist, development expert and thinker in South Asia. As the Executive Director of the Bangladesh Centre for Advanced Studies (BCAS), he turned the NGO into a leading think-tank on environment, resource management and sustainable development issues. He is well-known worldwide for his contribution to environment and nature conservation, climate change, poverty alleviation and sustainable development.



In 2008 Dr Atiq Rahman was honoured with a UN "Champion of the Earth" award in recognition of his outstanding leadership and contribution globally, regionally, nationally and locally, to the protection and sustainable management of the Earth's environment and natural resources. He is a long standing Lead Author and Convening Lead Author of the IPCC. As a lead author of the IPCC fourth Assessment, he was a co-recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize of 2007, jointly awarded to IPCC and Al Gore.

Mr Ben Reeves Australia

Mr Ben Reeves is currently the Director of the South Asia Section in the Australian Department of Home Affairs, which has policy responsibility for the Department's bilateral relationships with India, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Bhutan, Nepal and the Maldives.

Ben joined the Australian Department of Immigration in 2004, after completing the Graduate Development Program in the Australian Government Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry. He has worked in a variety of roles in Canberra, been posted to Timor-Leste and Bangladesh, and undertaken short-term assignments in Nauru, Egypt, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. Following his posting to Timor-Leste, Mr Reeves remained in Dili for 18 months, working with the International Organization for Migration.



Dr C R Abrar Bangladesh

Dr Abrar is the Executive Director of the Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU). RMMRU is a leading policy research, training and advocacy body on refugee, migration and displacement issues. He is a former professor of International Relations at the University of Dhaka.



Dr Abrar has conducted research on Rohingya refugees, Bihari stateless people, labour migration and recruitment industry issues over many years. He was educated at the Universities of Dhaka and Sussex before doing his PhD at Griffith University, Australia. He is a founding member of the Committee for the Protection of Fundamental Rights and a regular columnist in leading English dailies of Bangladesh.

Mr Dennis Villaseñor Philippines

Mr Dennis Villaseñor is an Assistant Director at the Department of the Interior of Local Government. He has had a wide variety of roles over a period of twenty years, being responsible for the development of policies and program on local development planning and budgeting, social protection concerns, and interior relations, among others.

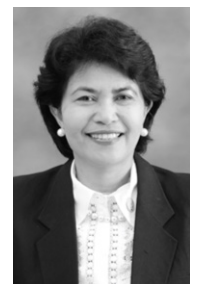


He had various engagements in several regional conferences, including Capacity Development Program to Make the Rights Real for Persons with Disability, ASEAN Taskforce Meeting on Business Registration, ASEAN Committee on Micro Small Medium Enterprise, and ASEAN Senior Officials Meeting on Transnational Crime.

Mr Villaseñor received his master degree in Public Management from Nueve Ecija University of Science and Technology in 2000 and his master degree in National Security Administration from the National Defense College of the Philippines in 2018.

Dr Dewi Fortuna Anwar Indonesia

Dr Dewi Fortuna Anwar is a Research Professor at the Center for Political Studies-Indonesian Institute of Sciences (P2P-LIPI) and was the Deputy Chair for Social Sciences and Humanities-LIPI (IPSK-LIPI) from 2001 to 2010. She is also the Chair of the Institute for Democracy and Human Rights, The Habibie Center. Between October 2010 and May 2015, Dewi served as Deputy Secretary for Political Affairs, and from May 2015 to February 2017 as Deputy for Government Policy Support to Vice President Boediono and Vice President M. Jusuf Kalla of the Republic of Indonesia, respectively. In 1998-99 Dewi served as Assistant Minister of State Secretariat for Foreign Affairs during the Habibie Presidency.



Dr Fortuna Anwar is currently a member of the Governing Board of Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) and a Board Member of Shift, based in New York. She obtained her PhD from Monash University, Melbourne in 1990, while her masters and bachelors degrees were from the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS), University of London.

Ms Ferdousi Akter Bangladesh

Ms Ferdousi Akter is an Additional Secretary with the Bangladesh Ministry of Home Affairs.

Mr Giorgi Gigauri International

Mr Giorgi Gigauri has served as the Chief of Mission of the International Organization for Migration (IOM) in Bangladesh since May 2018. He is the Co-Chair of the Strategic Executive Group of the Rohingya refugee response and the Coordinator of the UN Migration Network in Bangladesh.



Prior to his current appointment he served as the IOM Chief of Mission in Papua New Guinea, working on humanitarian emergencies, peacebuilding & community stabilization, and migration management. He was also formerly IOM Deputy Chief of Mission in Indonesia, overseeing a programme portfolio, which included migrant protection, humanitarian assistance, migration governance and development. Previous postings with IOM include Head of Programme Support in Ukraine, Project Development Officer in Moldova, and research support at the Regional Office in Austria. He has also led numerous emergency response surge teams in the Asia Pacific region. Giorgi holds a Master's degree from the University of Oxford, bachelor's degree from the University of Warwick, and a PhD from The Grigol Robakidze University.

Ms Haruno Nakashiba International

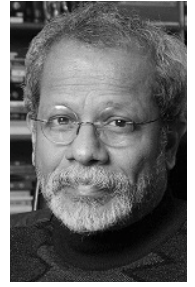
Ms Haruno Nakashiba is a Senior Protection Officer with the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) Bangladesh. She began working at UNHCR Bangladesh in November 2017. Ms Nakashiba joined UNHCR in 2004 and has since served in the Asia Pacific, Africa and the Middle East.



Ms Nakashiba holds a masters degree and Ph.D. in the sociology of education, from the University of Tokyo and master of laws degree in international human rights from the Queen Mary University of London.

Prof Imtiaz Ahmed Bangladesh

Prof Imtiaz Ahmed is Professor of International Relations at the University of Dhaka, and has served as Director of the University's Centre or Genocide Studies since 2012. He is the recipient of various awards and honours. He has authored, co-authored, or edited 16 books and 6 monographs. More than 100 of his research papers and scholarly articles have been published in leading journals and chapters in edited volumes.



Prof Ahmed was a Ford Foundation Fellow at the Oxford Centre for Islamic Studies (2004-2005) and a Rockefeller Fellow at the Rockefeller Foundation in Bellagio, Italy in 2002. He is currently a Visiting Professor at Sagesse University, Beirut.

Professor Ahmed completed his PhD at Carleton University, Ottawa and two masters degrees: one at the Research School of Pacific Studies, Australian National University and the other at the University of Dhaka.

Mr Jonathan Martens International

Mr Jonathan Martens is IOM's Senior Migrant Protection Specialist at IOM's Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific in Bangkok. He brings 20 years of experience to the position, having spent much of this time working with IOM on migration-related policies and programmes in Europe and Africa.



From 2007 to 2014, Jonathan was IOM's senior specialist on human trafficking issues in Geneva, Switzerland, where he was responsible for providing strategic direction, policy advice and operational guidance to IOM regional and country offices around the world. Since assuming his position with IOM's Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific, Jonathan has worked to support IOM member and observer states to strengthen protection and assistance frameworks for migrants in situations of vulnerability. He has overseen several regional programmes, including IOM X, and also serves as IOM's representative to various Bali Process working groups, including the working group on trafficking in persons and the working group on return and reintegration.

Mr Kantabhon Sukkaew Thailand

Mr Kantabhon Sukkaew is a Plan and Policy Analyst at the Directorate of Internal Security Strategy, Office of the National Security Council (NSC), Thailand. In this role, Mr Sukkaew is responsible for various issues ranging from human rights to migration, including voluntary return of Myanmar displaced persons.



Mr Sukkaew was trained as a Liberal Arts student focusing on Southeast Asian Studies, and has a background in both NGOs and the public sector. Prior to joining the NSC, Mr Sukkaew began his career working at the International Organization for Migration, as a team member of Thailand - Israel cooperation project (TIC). His work focused mainly on facilitating Thai farmers to work in Israel

Ms Kazi Akhmila International

Ms Kazi Akhmila has worked as the Associate Safeguards Officer (Resettlement) at the Asian Development Bank Bangladesh Resident Mission since 2016.

Ms Akhmila has worked in a range of organisations, practicing a rights-based approach to development since 2006, mostly on involuntary resettlement and research oriented activities. She has previously worked with the International Development and Relief Foundation and as a research associate at BRAC University.

Ms Akhmila holds a masters degree in development and human rights from Swansea University, Wales, United Kingdom.



Mr Khant Ko Ko Myanmar

Mr Khant Ko Ko is a Second Secretary at the International Organizations and Economic Department of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, and a desk officer for disarmament and non-proliferation matters. He has worked in the Foreign Ministry since August 2015.

Dr Md Abdur Razzaque is Research Director at the Policy Research Institute, Dhaka, Bangladesh. He is an economist specialising in applied international trade and development issues.



During 2012-17, he was Head of International Trade Policy at the Commonwealth Secretariat, London. He has led and managed numerous multi-country (involving sub-Saharan African, South Asian, Caribbean and Pacific economies) and Bangladesh-specific policy research and capacity-building projects.

Dr Razzaque holds a PhD from the University of Sussex and was a faculty member in the Economics Department of Dhaka University.

Mr Md Abu Bakr Siddique Bangladesh

Mr Md. Abu Bakr Siddique is Additional Secretary in the Public Security Division of the Bangladesh Ministry of Home Affairs. He took on this role in January 2018, after having joined in the Bangladesh Civil Service Administration Cadre in January 1991. He has worked in different positions in field administration and different ministries.



Mr. Siddique is a member of the National Task Force and Joint Working Group for repatriation of displaced Myanmar residents in Cox's Bazar. Among others, he also deals with bilateral and international issues, public order, issues related to human trafficking, money laundering, terrorism, illicit drugs, etc.

Mr Md Alauddin Bhuiyan is the Director (Myanmar) at the Bangladesh Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Mr Nazrul Islam is the Director General of Multilateral Economic Affairs at the Bangladesh Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Mr Md Mohsin Bangladesh

Mr Md. Mohsin is the Director General, Department of Disaster Management, Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief, Government of Bangladesh. His responsibilities include planning and formulating policy to mitigate disaster risk, managing humanitarian responses, and coordinating with development partners to pursue the government's disaster management goals.



As a practitioner, he is an expert on disaster management and the climate change sector in Bangladesh. He has played a key role in policy reforms such as formulation of National Plan for Disaster Management 2016-2020 and revising the Standing Orders on Disaster 2019. He is also the government focal point for recent revising the National Strategy on the Management of Disaster and Climate Induced Internal Displacement.

Mr Md. Mohsin has represented the Government of Bangladesh and played an important role in different International Conferences, such as COP, Asian Ministerial Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction, Global Platform for Disaster Risk Reduction, International Conference on Disability Inclusive Disaster Risk Management, Humanitarian Network and Partnership Week, etc.

Mr Michael Kourteff Australia

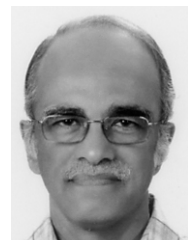
Mr Michael Kourteff is Assistant Director in the People Smuggling and Human Trafficking Task Force of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. He has previously served at Australian missions in Moscow, Cairo and Kuala Lumpur, and in divisions in Canberra covering geographic, multilateral, economic and international security issues.



In his current role, Mr Kourteff manages the Department's engagement in the Bali Process on People Smuggling, Trafficking in Persons and Related Transnational Crime, and co-chairs the Task Force on Planning and Preparedness which focuses on irregular maritime movement. Mr Kourteff holds a Master of International Relations from Monash University.

Mr Mofidul Hoque Bangladesh

Mr Mofidul Hoque is Director of the Center for the Study of Genocide and Justice, where he advances his vision of peace both nationally and globally. He is the key organiser of six International Conferences on Bangladesh Genocide and Justice, most recently in Dhaka in November 2019.



Mr Mofidul Hoque is also an author and social activist, and has written more than a dozen books on socio-cultural study and history. He has been awarded with the Bangla Academy Literary Prize and the "Ekushey Padak" National Award. He is the Founder-Trustee of the Liberation War Museum, a people's organisation established in 1996.

He is involved in promoting justice for genocide victims and the concept of peace and tolerance in society and also directs the Oral History Project of the museum which has accumulated more than 50,000 eye-witness accounts of history. Mr Mofidul Hoque completed his masters degree in sociology at Dhaka University.

Mr Pär Liljert International

Mr Pär Liljert began working as Chief of Mission: IOM Australia; Coordinator and Advisor for New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and the Pacific on 30 May 2018. From 2011 to 2018 Mr. Liljert served as the Special Envoy and Chief of Mission in China, representing IOM in the People's Republic of China, Mongolia and DPRK. Prior postings within IOM include postings as the Chief of Mission in Tanzania (2007-2011) and Chief of Mission in Zambia (2002-2004).



Previously, as a Donor Liaison Officer within the External Relations Department in IOM Headquarters, Geneva, Mr Liljert assisted with donor liaison for activities in Africa and IOM emergency operations in Sudan, Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), Pakistan, Indonesia, Sri Lanka and Lebanon. Before joining IOM Mr Liljert undertook an assignment at the Swedish Embassy in Gaborone, Botswana, working on issues related to regional integration in southern Africa.

Mr Liljert has a masters degree in political and social science from Lund University, Sweden and Pacific Lutheran University, Tacoma, USA. He also undertook studies at the University of Botswana and conducted his masters thesis in Botswana and Zimbabwe.

Dr Rebecca Miller International

Dr Rebecca Miller is Regional Coordinator for Human Trafficking and Migrant Smuggling at the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) based in Bangkok. Prior to this, she was the Manager for People Smuggling and Trafficking in Persons at Immigration New Zealand (INZ) and spent time seconded to the Bali Process Regional Support Office (RSO) based in Bangkok. Before joining INZ, Dr Miller advised governments and worked for various UN agencies, NGOs, and academic institutions, including the University of Auckland and the Institute for Population and Social Research (IPSR) in Bangkok.



Dr Miller studied Criminology, Sociology, and Education at the University of Toronto and Queen's University in Canada, and obtained her PhD in Development Studies from the University of Auckland. Her career has taken her to over fourteen countries throughout Southeast Asia, Africa, and the Pacific. With experience in policy analysis, strategic planning, and research and evaluation, Dr Miller has primarily focused on trafficking in persons, migrant smuggling, human rights, gender, and social protection.

Ms Rebecca Valentine Australia

Ms Rebecca Valentine is the Assistant Director, Protracted Crises Section in the Humanitarian and Refugee Policy Branch at the Australian Government Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

Ms Valentine manages Australia's response to the humanitarian crises in Bangladesh and Myanmar. She has previously worked in a range of humanitarian and development roles with DFAT covering Southeast Asia and the Pacific, including a regional humanitarian posting in Fiji.



Ms Valentine holds a masters degree in international law, specialising in humanitarian and refugee law, and an honours degree in politics and international relations.

Dr Saleemul Huq Bangladesh

Dr Saleemul Huq is an expert on the links between climate change and sustainable development, particularly from the perspective of developing countries. He is currently the director of the International Centre for Climate Change and Development (ICCCAD) in Bangladesh.



Dr Saleemul was the lead author of the chapter on Adaptation and Sustainable Development in the third assessment report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, and was the lead author of the chapter on Adaptation and Mitigation in the IPCC's fourth assessment report.

His current work is on supporting the engagement of the least developed countries in the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. He is researching the least developed countries' vulnerability to climate change and the impact of adaptation measures. Previously he served as Executive Director of Bangladesh Centre for Advanced Studies

Ms Serena Grant Australia

Ms Serena Grant leads Walk Free's business engagement activities on modern slavery and human trafficking, including the Bali Process Government and Business Forum. Through this work, Walk Free engages government and business leaders to drive higher standards on supply chain transparency, ethical recruitment and worker protection.



Prior to joining Walk Free, Serena was a Director at the Thomson Reuters Foundation in London where she ran Trust-Law, the Foundation's pro bono legal service that connects NGOs and social enterprises with law firms around the world. She also led several initiatives focused on combating modern slavery, including the Banks Alliance Against Trafficking in the US and supported the Trust Conference, a global forum focused on modern slavery and human rights. Prior to this, Serena worked as a corporate lawyer at international law firms in Tokyo, Sydney and London.

Mr Steve Scott Australia

Mr Scott has been Assistant Secretary of the Humanitarian and Refugee Policy Branch since 2015. He has also served as a Senior Adviser on North Asian and North American affairs for Foreign Minister Marise Payne, Acting Chief Innovation Officer, and Assistant Secretary of the Consular Policy Branch - where he led the teams for the Egypt, Libya, Christchurch and Japan consular emergency responses in 2011.



Since joining the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) in 1994, Mr Scott has served overseas as Deputy Ambassador in the Philippines, Minister-Counsellor Political and Economic Section in Indonesia, Economic Counsellor in China and Second/First Secretary Economic in Malaysia.

Stephen has a bachelor of business degree, with honours in economics, from Curtin University, Western Australia. He has also completed a 'leadership in crisis' post-graduate course at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government and a graduate diploma in finance and investment with the Securities Institute of Australia.

Dato' Steven Wong is the former Deputy Chief Executive and Member of the Board of the Institute of Strategic and International Studies (ISIS) Malaysia. In that position, he also headed the Institute's economics division. He has worked in the public policy arena for 25 years and has spent an additional eight years in the private sector, where he held senior positions in the capital markets, investment strategy and research, fund management and management consultancy.

Dato' Steve Wong has extensive experience in regional affairs, having headed East Asia research with ISIS, and having been on the secretariats of two ASEAN eminent persons groups. He received his graduate and post-graduate education from the University of Melbourne.

Dato' Steven was a member of the Ministry of Human Resource's Technical Committee for the Minimum Wage and Tenaga Nasional Berhad's Economic Council. He has served as the Secretary-General of the Malaysian National Committee for Pacific Economic Co-operation and the Malaysian Committee for Pacific Basin Economic Cooperation.

2LT Soramongkhon Mangalasiri Thailand



2LT. Soramongkhon Mangalasiri is a director for Displaced Persons Policy Coordination and Illegal Migration within the Foreign Affairs Division in the Office of the Permanent Secretary for Interior, Ministry of Interior of the Royal Thai Government. He also has worked as an Assistant Director of the Operation Center for Displaced Persons (OCDP), Ministry of Interior.

Both positions handle issues of irregular migration. In particular, in his position as Assistant Director of OCDP, he was responsible for Myanmar displaced persons that reside in temporary shelters along the Thai-Myanmar border. This position required him to take a vital role in facilitating the voluntary repatriation program for Myanmar displaced persons.

Ms Tara Cavanagh Australia



Ms Tara Cavanagh is the Minister-Counsellor Home Affairs at the Australian High Commission in New Delhi. She started her career working in criminal and family law in Melbourne, Australia, before joining the then Department of Immigration as a Graduate Administrative Assistant over 20 years ago.

Since then she has enjoyed a varied and fulfilling career working primarily in the visa and citizenship service delivery business, with postings to Belgrade, Colombo and now New Delhi, as well as a temporary transfer to Perth, Western Australia for three years where she was Deputy State Director.

Most recently, Ms Cavanagh has spent time in Canberra working on the visa reform proposal, and as the Assistant Secretary of the Visa Business Optimisation Branch, a role that has given her a good insight into the challenges we face in delivering a large, complex, global visa operation.

Dr Tasneem Siddiqui

Bangladesh

Dr Tasneem Siddiqui is a leading migration scholar of Bangladesh. Her work on drivers and impact of labour migration, female labour migration, diaspora, remittances, climate change adaptation and migration, have been published nationally and internationally. She is the Founding Chair of Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU) and Professor of Political Science at the University of Dhaka.



Dr Siddiqui has contributed to major policy changes on migration in Bangladesh. For example, she drafted the National Strategy for Climate and Disaster Induced Internally Displaced Persons in Bangladesh for the Ministry of Disaster and Relief and UNDP (2015). She was one of the key members that drafted the national Overseas Employment Policy, 2006 and the Law Commission initiated draft of the Overseas Employment and Migration Act of 2013. Her research on female labour migration has contributed to the lifting of the ban on international migration of low skilled women from Bangladesh in 2003.

More recently, RMMRU's research and policy advocacy has contributed to changing the perception of migration from a failure of local level adaptation to a more inclusive view that treats migration as one of the tools of climate change adaptation in Bangladesh.

Dr Travers McLeod

Australia

Dr Travers McLeod is Chief Executive Officer of the Centre for Policy Development (CPD) in Australia. He formerly worked as a Policy Adviser for the Oxford Martin School at the University of Oxford, where he focused on 'Now for the Long Term': the report of the Oxford Martin Commission for Future Generations.



Dr McLeod has taught in Australia and the UK, including nearly two years as a Lecturer in Politics and International Relations at Merton College, Oxford. He has also worked as a lawyer and was an associate to Justice Michael Kirby in the High Court of Australia. Dr McLeod remains an Associate of the Oxford Martin School and is an Honorary Fellow of the University of Melbourne's School of Social and Political Sciences and the University of Western Australia's Faculty of Law.

Dr McLeod graduated from the University of Western Australia with honours degrees in Arts and Law. He has a DPhil and MPhil (Dist) in international relations at Balliol College, Oxford, where he studied as a Rhodes Scholar.

Mr Ye Minn Thein

Myanmar

Mr Ye Minn Thein is the Director of International Organisations and Economic Department of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar. Prior to this role, he served as Minister Counsellor at the Permanent Mission of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar to the United Nations from 2015 and 2019. He has also held positions in Bangladesh and India with the Myanmar Ministry of Foreign Affairs.



Between 2013 and 2015, Mr Ye Minn Thein was a member of the working group on 'Combatting Human Trafficking, Myanmar' and in 2016 he was elected as a member of the Finance Committee of the International Seabed Authority (Law of the Sea).

Mr Ye Minn Thein has a Masters in Public Management from the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, and the National University of Singapore, and was a United Nations Disarmament Fellow in 1998.
