CPD's Wellbeing Government Initiative

CPD's <u>Wellbeing Government Initiative</u> is about entrenching wellbeing at the heart of Australian policymaking.


This is the second of our regular Wellbeing Roundtables to connect high-level policymakers from across Australia. Our first Wellbeing Roundtable was held in May 2022.

Recent research outputs include:

- <u>Redefining Progress: Global lessons for an Australian approach to wellbeing</u> This report looks at 21 global approaches to wellbeing over the past 50 years, and identifies key characteristics of advanced wellbeing approaches to guide Australia's wellbeing journey.
- Principles for an effective wellbeing budget

This briefing builds on the research contained in the *Redefining Progress* report, to articulate working principles for the October 2022 Federal Budget in the context of a broader Australian approach to wellbeing government and economics.

We have also developed a suite of future research projects for the next 6 months. Our ongoing research agenda will be shaped by the feedback we get from roundtable members.



Wellbeing: Commonwealth Government and the ACT

The Federal Treasury's Commonwealth Budget

Budget Statement 4: <u>Measuring What Matters</u> appeared in last month's Federal Budget. The Treasury have committed to releasing a stand-alone *Measuring What Matters Statement* in 2023. This statement will draw on OECD work and Treasury are calling for <u>submissions</u> to help them shape the statement and adapt the OECD framework to Australia.

Wellbeing in the Australian Capital Territory

The ACT developed a <u>Wellbeing Framework</u> through an extensive process of community consultation in 2019-20. The ACT Government has started the process of using the Wellbeing Framework and the information it provides to inform Government priorities, policies and investment decisions – <u>including through Budget</u> and <u>Cabinet processes</u>.

VicHealth Wellbeing Website and Wellbeing Toolkit

VicHealth – a health promotion agency that operates at arms' length from government – has launched a <u>new webpage dedicated to How to Create a Wellbeing</u> <u>Economy</u>. It hosts a <u>Wellbeing Toolkit</u>, developed to be a blueprint for governments (Federal, State, Territory) to progress a wellbeing economy approach in Australia.
