### The Australia-Indonesia Energy Transition Policy Dialogue

The Centre for Policy Development (CPD) is pleased to partner with Climateworks Centre to convene the new **Australia-Indonesia Energy Transition Policy Dialogue** as part of CPD's *Australia in the Indo Pacific Program* and building on years of work in sustainable economies and dialogues in the region. The Dialogue will be a multi-year endeavour which aims to advance progress on energy transition in Australia and Indonesia.

#### **Role of the Dialogue**

The Dialogue will be a forum for collaboration between policymakers, regulators, business and non-government experts from Australia, Indonesia and the region to discuss policy ideas and areas of potential collaboration on energy transition issues. It will create a safe space where participants from all perspectives can come on an equal playing field to discuss possibilities outside of their day-to-day roles and in a Chatham house setting.

Convenors of the Dialogue look forward to:

- o convening regular Roundtable meetings (in person, virtually and in hybrid format) to discuss policy ideas and areas of collaboration;
- using evidence-based research and analysis to discuss and assess alternative energy transition models;
- supporting the implementation of the Bali Compact, and Bali Energy Transition Roadmap for Indonesia, Australia and the region;
- leveraging agreements made at the 2022 G20 and ensure momentum is sustained into 2023 and beyond.

Dialogue members are encouraged to bring their curiosity, creativity and collegiality to the policy challenges confronting both countries, and use the roundtables to test ideas, gain insight and build collaboration. The Dialogue will not be about admiring the problem, but about developing practical, workable solutions to the energy challenges facing Australia and Indonesia. As such, topics for discussion at these meetings will be guided by participants.

This initiative builds on collaborative work between CPD, Climateworks Centre, the Institute of Essential Services Reform (IESR), Indonesia Research Institute for Decarbonization (IRID) and the International Institute for Sustainable Development (IISD), including co-convening a successful <u>G20</u> <u>Seminar Series</u> with the Energy Transition Working Group in Jakarta in July 2022.

### Our approach & initial focus

All Dialogue meetings will be invitation only and held under the Chatham House Rule of non-attribution.

The first Roundtable will take place in-person in Canberra and Jakarta on **Tuesday 6 December 2022**, shortly after the conclusion of COP27 and the G20 Leaders Summit, and before Indonesia takes over as ASEAN Chair in 2023.

This initial meeting will work to identify areas of focus for the group going forward, and we welcome your ideas and active engagement.

The next roundtable is envisaged for early 2023 with a focus on the \$200m Australia-Indonesia climate and infrastructure partnership.

## Indonesia G20: Clear and concrete commitments in Just Transition



- Endorsement of Bali Compact and Bali Energy Transition Roadmap
- Establishment of the Energy Transition Mechanism (ETM) Country Platforms in Indonesia
  - Early retirement of coal-fired power plants
  - Simultaneous development of renewable energy
  - Platform managed by PT Sarana Multi Infrastruktur
  - Financing support from Climate Investment Funds and cooperation support with international institutions
- Launch of Just Energy Transition Partnership mobilise \$20 billion over next 3-5 years to accelerate a just energy transition

# COP27: Elevated the concerns of the Global South including adaptation, water, food, just transition

- Agreed to establish first-ever Loss & Damage financial facility
  - But outstanding questions on sources of funding, recipients of funding, and quantum of funding (countries only pledged \$350M, or 0.01% of costs already incurred from climate disasters in '22)
- Launch of the Sharm El Sheikh Adaptation Agenda to catalyse non state actors
- South Africa published Just Energy Implementation Plan endorsed by international partners
- **\$20B Just Energy Transition Partnership agreed by Indonesia** and international partners, potential for additional agreements with Vietnam, Senegal, India to follow
- Egypt announced \$15B "Nexus on Water Food and Energy" package of mitigation, adaptation
   & development projects
- Regional Finance Forums identified 450+ projects requiring \$600B of financing
- More sophisticated finance discussion including sector guidance for net-zero transition planning by financial institutions; and demands for reform of the IMF and MDBs gathered pace,

### **Cluster 1: Infrastructure and Just Energy Transition**

Coal power phase-out

Development of renewable and alternative energy

Energy subsidy reforms

Social & economic aspects of the energy transition

- Sustainable financing for decommissioning
- Impacts on electricity market & coal mining
- Manufacturing & supply chains (eg. batteries & critical minerals)
- Deployment and grid connection & management
- Energy access and off-grid deployment
- Battery & electric vehicle supply chains
- Charging infrastructure
- Electric vehicle conversions
- Decarbonisation of steel and cement
- Reforms to fossil fuel subsidies to encourage electrification, renewables and sustainable fuels

- Workforce planning and training

# Australia-Indonesia Climate & Infrastructure Partnership

What we know about the partnership...

- \$200 million climate and infrastructure partnership
- Announced at the Indonesia-Australia Annual Leaders' Meeting in Bogor on 6 June 2022
- The content of the partnership will be developed between officials and launched once mutually agreed

Propose that at our next Dialogue in early 2023 we focus on the partnership

With an aim to help develop and contribute useful views on what it could achieve

For example: guiding principles and priorities, potential initiative areas, and how the partnership could operate

# Potential key questions for the Australia-Indonesia Climate Partnership to discuss in future dialogue



What principles should guide the partnership's focus?

For example:

- Prioritisation
- Role of private funding sources
- Collaboration with industry
- *Etc...*



What are some potential initiatives the partnership could consider?



What should be the partnership's operating model?

For example:

- Infrastructure
- Sustainable finance for green tech or coal decommissioning
- *Etc...*

For example:

- How should the partnership be structured? (e.g., investment fund, joint investment agency etc.)
- How should initiatives be funded? (e.g., grants, concessional loans, blended financing etc.)

# Guiding principles

In our next session we could discuss examples of some best practices in setting clear principles for similar initiatives

#### Prioritise for impact

Focus on few vs. many areas to maximise impact (avoid fragmentation)

#### Leverage country-specific advantages

Focus on areas of unique relevance to partner nations based on climate challenges and national advantages

#### Catalyse ongoing action

Use the partnership to catalyse further/ongoing investment and action (e.g., private funding sources, role of markets)

### Coordinate finance and policy

Integrated coordination between funding and policy (e.g., stimulus, regulation) delivers the best results

### Collaboration beyond government

Involve industry (and others as relevant - e.g. third sector) in development and delivery of initiatives

### Outcomes-led

Set an ambition that includes clear, tangible & measurable outcomes for the partnership
